The Indiana Broacast Pioneer Howard Caldwell, Hal, & Kevin Gregory

Hall of Fame member began his career as a teenager working for WIRE radio in Indianapolis. After his graduation from I.U. he became a disc jockey at a Sandusky, Ohio radio station. Next was Youngstown, Ohio, hosting programs for young audiences. Then it was back to Indianapolis and in 1960 he began a 12 year stint as "Harlow Hickenlooper", for WFBM TV. He was a stumbling, fumbling, loveable character who hosted the popular "Three Stooges" movies and tooka prodigious pie pummeling over the years. The program also featured co-hosts Curly Meyers and Jerry Vance as Captain Starr with the three of them performing skits and singing songs for a live studio audience.

As a result of his "Three Stooges connection" Hal landed a role in the Stooges' 1965 feature film "The Outlaws Is Coming. "Fryar was also the host for several other children's shows during his 43 years in local television, including appearances as "Grandpa Harlow" on WFYI-TV. The

WLFI TV Small Market # 188*

In 1953 the inauguration of President Dwight D. Eisenhower was televised, Queen Elizabeth II was formally crowned as The Queen in England, Playboy Magazine's 1st issue featured Marilyn Monroe on its cover and the first color television sets went

on sale in the U.S. for about \$1,175. The top rated TV show at that time was "I Love Lucy" and at 6:00 p.m. on June 15, Lafayette residents got their first glimpse of locally broadcast television on WFAM Channel 59. The first day consisted of four hours of programming one of which was "Ringside with Rasslers". There were 20 employees but only



one had any television experience. The station was owned by O.E. Richardson who received a permit to broadcast from Lafayette.

WFAM radio was originally assigned to South Bend, Indiana until 1941 when WSBT was granted full time status. The license for WFAM was then sold to Richardson; one of the owners of WJOB (formerly WWAE) in Hammond, Indiana. In 1942 Richardson moved the station again, this time to Lafayette, Indiana in early 1942 where the call-letters were changed to WASK and the station was granted full time operating status. In the 50s the station was sold to Sarkes Tarzian who changed the call letters back to WFAM when he built a television station, WFAM-TV, Channel 59.

In 1957 WFAM moved to Channel 18 and then around 1967 the call letters were changed to WLFI-TV. The station was owned by Block Communications from 1979 until 2000, when current owner LIN Television acquired WLFI. Through the years WLFI was a CBS and DuMont affiliate. During the late 1950s, the station was also briefly affiliated with the NTA Film Network.

Some recognizable names spent some time at the Lafayette station and most are still in Indiana. The list includes, Angela Buchman, Meteorologist, WISH-TV, Kevin Gregory, Chief Meteorologist, WRTV, Paul Poteet, Meteorologist, WRTV, Mary McDermott, anchor, now at sister station WISH-TV, Angela Ganote, anchor/reporter, now at WXIN-TV.



Brian Lamb Hosting "Dance Date"

Another WLFI alum is Brian Lamb who at the age of 17 held a radio disc jockey job at WASK radio station in Lafayette. During his junior year at Purdue in 1961-62, Lamb approached WLFI station owner Dick Shively with an idea for an American



Bandstand type TV dance show. Shively liked the idea and gave Lamb the go-ahead and a time slot. The show was titled "Dance Date", and the now producer Lamb, named himself as host. The

program aired on weekday afternoons for a half-hour and was a hit with viewers. Later in his varied career Lamb created C-SPAN, the public affairs television network. He was inducted into the Indiana Broadcast Pioneers Hall of Fame in 2005.

WLFI TV remains on the air as channel 18, and is the CBS television affiliate in West Lafayette, Indiana that serves the Lafayette, Indiana metropolitan area. It operates on digital channel 11. Its transmitter is located in Rossville, Indiana and is now owned by LIN Television, who also owns WISH-TV in Indianapolis, WANE-TV in Fort Wayne and WTHI-TV in Terre Haute. *Nielsen 2012

Burl Ives, Indiana Broadcaster

Born in 1909 in Jasper County, Illinois



Burl Ive's spent many hours during his early years singing with his mother while doing farm hores. In 1929 Ive's was

in his junior year at Eastern Illinois State Teachers College, he was sitting

in English class and suddenly realized he was wasting his time. He got up and walked out the door. Sixty years later, the school named a building after its most famous dropout. Pursuing his dream of a singing career he was in Richmond, Indiana on July 23, 1929 where he did a trial recording of "Behind the Clouds" for

the well known Gennett label. The recording was later rejected and destroyed. Ives traveled about the U.S. as an itinerant singer during the early 1930s, earning his way by doing odd jobs and playing his banjo. Around 1931 he began performing on WBOW radio in Terre Haute, Indiana where he also went back to school, attending classes at Indiana State Teachers College (Indiana State University). During the late 1930s Ives also attended the Julliard School in New York. In his long and diverse career Mr. Ives made 32 movies and more than 100 record albums, appeared on Broadway and performed on radio and television. Two of his big hits were children's songs, "Frosty the Snowman" and "Rudolph the Red-Nosed Reindeer." His last recording, "The Magic Balladeer," was issued in 1993, shortly before his 84th birthday. A long time pipe and cigar smoker, Ives died of mouth cancer on

April 14, 1995.

Registration forms will be sent to all Indiana Broadcast Pioneer members prior to the event.


IBA President Linda Compton Retires


The Indiana Broadcasters Association board has annnounced the retirement of Linda Compton as President and CEO. Linda has 30 + years in the association management field.



Herbert W. Brabander, who was known as Jay Walker during more than four decades of broadcasting in Fort Wayne, died Wednesday afternoon. He was 74.

Walker was born in Chicago and had worked as a disc jockey in Boston and

Ann Arbor, Mich., before coming to Fort Wayne in 1966.

He made his greatest mark as the weatherman for WPTA-TV, Channel 21, where, as fellow broadcasters put it, he became a beloved fixture on the news.

Walker loved his job and his

audience learned to love his sometimes unconventional way of presenting the weather. The former Marine didn't predict rain. He predicted what he called spritzles and leaky skies. Instead of predicting a clear night he'd forecast a snipe night, perfect for snipe hunts.

He predicted heat waves with a red hand on a spring, and cold waves with a blue hand.

"Whatever it is that makes you great, Jay had it," said Melissa Long, an anchor at WPTA who worked with Walker from the early 1990s until 2006, when he retired. "He was lovable. There wasn't a mean bone in his body. He was the most well-known TV person in town, but he was totally humble."

Though Walker was best known as a weatherman, he got his start in the city in 1966, when he joined WLYV-AM radio, which used rock 'n' roll and a pack of young, energetic disc jockeys to beat WOWO-AM radio in the ratings inside Fort Wayne.

In 1976, Walker joined WPTA in production and became the prime-time weatherman in 1979. In the mid-1990s, he moved to WOWO as the morning talk host but returned to WPTA.

After his retirement Walker remained active by hosting local events.

Lynda was proud to have helped found the Indy 500 News Bureau, providing content for media outlets worldwide about her beloved Indy 500 and the competing drivers. She was proud to have been a leader in the News Bureau again for the 2012 race. Lynda was introduced to the beauty of Alaska by becoming a friend of and dog handler for competitors in the Iditarod Sled Dog Race, and was able to travel to Alaska for multiple starts. In the early days of the internet, she provided constant updates on the Alaskan race for fans around the country. Prior to her racing career, Lynda had been an advertising manager at Esterline Angus Instrument Co., and had worked at WTTV-4 television and WNDE radio stations. She was preceded in death by her mother Jeanne Johnson and her father Harry Sharpnack. She is survived by her adoring husband of over 37 years, Gary L. Havens, her brother Eric Sharpnack (Roxann), her sister Dianne Stephenson, stepfather Robert Johnson, as well as seven nieces and nephews,
